LESSONS IN A SEED

Today's Gospel offers us two parables of successful growth. In the parable of the Seed Growing to Harvest there is a contrast between the inactivity of the sower after the initial sowing, and the active "sprouting and growing" of the seed. The sower goes his way, the seed sprouts and grows without him. In the parable of the Mustard Seed the insignificance of the tiny seed is contrasted with the mighty tree it produces. Growth begins with the sowing of a seed. A seed contains the essence of life and enables all life to continue. It has boundless potential in its tiny form but unless it is planted in favourable conditions it cannot realise its potential. It can then bloom where it is planted.

To bloom where God plants us is to avail of every opportunity that life offers us and to be grateful. Every time we love and do good we plant a seed. Every time we give a word of encouragement we plant a seed. Every time we pray for someone we plant a seed. Every time we have a good thought towards someone we plant a seed. God calls us to be sowers of seed. A seed will sprout and grow and produce a harvest when it is sown. It does what God intends it to do. But it must die. It has to end its life for something else more beautiful and visible to grow. What begins as a single grain becomes the source of many grains.

Jesus reminds us of this when he said in John 12:24 "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies it remains a single grain. But if it dies, it bears much fruit".

A seed represents hope and a new beginning. When we nurture seeds of compassion, joy and generosity we challenge jealousy, anger and self- doubt. Like the tiny seed, each one of us has the power within us to do great things and create new beginnings. Jesus in his teaching about the Kingdom of God used three parables about sowing seeds and reaping a harvest. The harvest does not depend on us. God is always at work. Like the birds of the air who shelter in the branches of the tree that sprouted from the tiny mustard seed, we all benefit from the sowers of seed who have gone before us.

Robert Louis Stevenson has left us a famous quote: *Don't judge each day by the harvest you reap but by the seeds that you plant.*

We have been operating for over 40 years in Clondalkin Village and surrounding areas.

All of us are volunteers. Here's how this initiative works: referrals are made by the District Nurses and meals are provided by Peamount Hospital. We deliver 2 meals and 2 deserts on Tuesdays & Thursdays (for which there is a small charge). We have 3 routes which are looked after by several volunteer groups: 1 for Tuesday and 1 for Thursday and there is also a volunteer dedicated to collecting the meals from Peamount to distribute to the 3 routes at Knockmitten Church Car Park.

Our volunteers give 1-2 hours of their time either on a Tuesday or a Thursday, 2 weeks on/2 weeks off and this is worked out between themselves.

So, with this in mind, any new volunteers would be put in touch with the Group for whichever day they are free and they would then organise their schedule with this Group.

Also, those collecting the meals from Peamount do so a month on/month off basis, again this is organised with a team of collectors.

ST. JOHN FISHER (1469-1535) MARTYR Feast Day 22nd June

John Fisher was a quiet, scholarly man. He was born in Yorkshire in 1469. His father was a wool merchant and he sent his son to Cambridge. John Fisher graduated as a Bachelor in 1488. In 1491 he took his Mastership and became a Fellow of Michael House. In 1501 he became a Doctor of Divinity and Vice Chancellor. In 1504 he was Chancellor of the University. This progress shows his scholarly interests. Even more significant was his choice of the famous humanist, Erasmus, to lecture at the University.

Fisher was a friend of Thomas More and of those who aimed at a reform of education especially for the clergy. In 1504 he was appointed Bishop of Rochester.

The events which led to his death was the King's decision to repudiate his wife, Catherine of Aragon, and to claim Headship of the Church of England when the Pope refused to sanction the King's decision. On 16 April 1534, John Fisher was lodged in the Tower of London together with Thomas More. Both had refused to take the oath of Succession acknowledging the issue of Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn as legitimate heirs to the Throne.

Fisher's trial took place in Westminster Hall on June 17th 1535. He was found guilty of high treason for denying that the King was Supreme Head of the Church of England. On the morning of June 22nd, 1535, John Fisher was roused from sleep before five o'clock. The Lieutenant of the Tower told him that he was to die that day. "Well", he said, "if this be your errand you bring me no great news, for I have long looked for this message. And I must humbly thank the King's Majesty that it pleaseth him to rid me from all this worldly business. And I thank you also for your tidings."

His friend Thomas More, who was to follow him to the scaffold within a few days, wrote of him: "I reckon in this realm no one man, in wisdom, learning and long approved virtue together, meet to be matched and compared with him."
