70 Years of Priestly Ministry

This Sunday we say congratulations and extend our warmest wishes to Fr. Des Byrne CSSp as he marks the 70th anniversary of his ordination and as his ministry in Knockmitten draws to a close.

Fr. Des was ordained in Rome on 4th July 1954 as a priest for the Spiritan Congregation. After his ordination Fr. Des ministered in Nigeria for many years before returning to work in Ireland. Fr. Des has ministered in Clondalkin parish at Knockmitten since 1998.

Over the 70 years of his priesthood, Fr. Des has undoubtedly seen tremendous change in the life of the Church. It's hard perhaps for

many of us today to realise that Fr. Des was ordained in a pre-Vatican II Church. The 1950s was a time that saw a huge increase in vocations to the priesthood in Ireland. Many men, like Fr. Des, joined religious congregations and did tremendous work over the years in bringing the Gospel message of Jesus to all parts of the world, founding and building faith communities that still thrive in many countries today.

The people of Knockmitten have been blessed and well served by Fr. Des for the past 26 years. He has ministered to them through all the ups and downs of the past quarter of a century, celebrating with people on the many happy occasions as well as in the sadder moments of everyday life. Fr. Des has built up the faith community in Knockmitten in his time here and leaves a legacy that will endure long after him.

This weekend we say a heartfelt "Thank You" to Fr. Des as he calls time on his ministry in Knockmitten. We wish Fr. Des every blessing as he adjusts to retirement with his confreres in the Spiritan house in Kimmage. At 97 years of age and after 70 years of priestly ministry, it is well earned and well deserved.

Feast Day 8th July

St. Kilian is one of the Patron Saints for sufferers of Rheumatism. He is the Patron Saint of the parish

of Tuosist, near Kenmare in County Kerry, where he is believed to have resided before travelling to Germany. A Church and Holy Well are named after him and his feast



day is traditionally celebrated with a *pattern* when crowds visit the Well for prayers, followed by evening social events. He is also the Patron Saint of Paderborn, Germany.

'Thank You' from Clondalkin Village Festival Committee

The Clondalkin Festival Organising Committee thanks Rev. Fr Coghlan and all concerned regarding the Organ Recital which took place as part of the Festival. Feedback strongly indicates that the audience enjoyed the recital very much.



We have been operating for over 40 years in Clondalkin Village and surrounding areas.

All of us are volunteers. Here's how this initiative works: referrals are made by the District Nurses and meals are provided by Peamount Hospital. We deliver 2 meals and 2 deserts on Tuesdays & Thursdays (for which there is a small charge). We have 3 routes which are looked after by several volunteer groups: 1 for Tuesday and 1 for Thursday and there is also a volunteer dedicated to collecting the meals from Peamount to distribute to the 3 routes at Knockmitten Church Car Park.

Our volunteers give 1-2 hours of their time either on a Tuesday or a Thursday, 2 weeks on/2 weeks off and this is worked out between themselves.

So, with this in mind, any new volunteers would be put in touch with the Group for whichever day they are free and they would then organise their schedule with this Group.

Also, those collecting the meals from Peamount do so a month on/month off basis, again this is organised with a team of collectors.

We look forward to hearing from you!

Carlo Acutis and 14 Blesseds approved for Canonization

The College of Cardinals gathered with Pope Francis on Monday morning (1st July) in the Vatican's Apostolic Palace for an Ordinary Public Consistory.

Cardinal Marcelo Semeraro, Prefect of the Dicastery for the Causes of the Saints, presented a brief report—known in Latin as the *Peroratio*—on the lives and miracles of the 15 people under consideration, after which the Consistory voted and approved their canonization. The names of these 14 new Saints will be inscribed in the List of Saints on Sunday, October 20, 2024.

Pope Francis and the Consistory of Cardinals then voted to approve the canonization of the first Saint from Generation Y, those born between 1981 and 1996 commonly known as

millennials. Blessed Carlo Acutis will likely be proclaimed a Saint during the 2025 Jubilee, possibly along with other

canonizations. Born to Italian parents in London, England, in 1991, Blessed Carlo was a web designer who died from leukemia at the age of 15 in Monza, Italy. He was known for

his devotion to Eucharistic miracles and Marian apparitions, which he catalogued on a website he designed. According to the *Peroratio*, Blessed Carlo was *"welcoming and caring*

towards the poorest, and he helped the homeless, the needy, and immigrants with the money he saved from his weekly allowance."

UNITED NATIONS WORLD POPULATION DAY



11th July

It took hundreds of thousands of years for the world population to grow to 1 billion – then in just another 200 years or so, it grew sevenfold. In 2011, the global population reached the 7 billion mark, it stands at almost 7.9 billion in 2021, and it's expected to grow to around 8.5 billion in 2030, 9.7 billion in 2050, and 10.9 billion in 2100. This dramatic growth has been driven largely by increasing numbers of people surviving to reproductive age, and has been accompanied by major changes in fertility rates, increasing urbanization and accelerating migration. These trends will have far-reaching implications for generations to come.

The recent past has seen enormous changes in fertility rates and life expectancy. In the early 1970s, women had on average 4.5 children each; by 2015, total fertility for the world had fallen to below 2.5 children per woman. Meanwhile, average global lifespans have risen, from 64.6 years in the early 1990s to 72.6 years in 2019. In addition, the world is seeing high levels of urbanization and accelerating migration. 2007 was the first year in which more people lived in urban areas than in rural areas, and by 2050 about 66 per cent of the world population will be living in cities. These megatrends have far-reaching implications. They affect economic development, employment, income distribution, poverty and social protections. They also affect efforts to ensure universal access to health care, education, housing, sanitation, water, food and energy. To more sustainably address the needs of individuals, policymakers must understand how many people are living on the planet, where they are, how old they are, and how many people will come after them.
