This Building Hope Pastoral Strategic Planning Resource 2025–2027 for Parishes and Parish Partnerships launches a significant phase of the Building Hope pastoral renewal initiative. It is time now for us to focus our collective attention on specific actions, which we will undertake together in parish/partnership across the Archdiocese over the next three years.

At the heart of the Christian life and of our Mission, is encounter with Jesus. Our Building Hope actions stem from that personal encounter building communities of CO-RESPONSIBILITY through SERVANT LEADERSHIP, communities that are active in SOCIAL JUSTICE, communities of WELCOME & INCLUSION, communities that are FAITH-FILLED, centred on the Person of Jesus Christ.

This pastoral planning resource and the actions we are invited to take are drawn from consultation, dialogue and discernment with people across the Diocese as the Building Hope conversations have evolved over the last three years.

We invite you to pray the Building Hope Prayer frequently and to open your heart to what the Lord might be asking of you and your faith community today as we walk together as one synodal and missionary Church, welcoming the creative work of the Holy Spirit among us and with us. We place our trust in the loving kindness of God:

- planning pastoral actions together to build up faith-filled communities of co-responsible servant leadership, with a central focus on social justice;
- planning pastoral actions together to become more fully a people of welcome and compassion, who embody the power, hope and joy of the gospel;
- planning pastoral actions together to better accompany all people, including families, children, young people, those marginalized or who feel themselves excluded.

And in all we plan together, we remain open to the Spirit, listening to where the Spirit is calling us. As a community of faith we will explore this resource so we become familiar with it. We will PRAY together, REFLECT together, PLAN together for its implementation in parishes and partnerships of parishes across the Archdiocese. We will need to take co-ordinated action together, encouraging and supporting each other, continually opening our hearts to renewal and new beginnings May the Lord bless us as we rediscover hope, proclaim hope and build hope together.

The Eucharist - what do we believe ... and what difference does it make?

Fáinche Ryan: Zoom - Thursday Oct 31st, 2024 8.00 p.m.

The Second Vatican Council reminded us that the Eucharist is 'the source and summit of the Christian life' (Lumen Gentium 11), while Augustine, in a homily on the Eucharist advised "It is your own mystery that you are receiving! You are saying "Amen" to what you are ..." This presentation will seek to explain something of the mystery of this gift of the Eucharist, of what it means for a baptised person to participate in the Eucharist, and also the impact of what it means to say that the Church makes the Eucharist while at once the Eucharist makes the Church. The presentation aims to be both instructive and challenging and to go some way toward addressing the many questions put to me over the years about this mystery we receive.

St Colman of Kilmacduagh (560-632) Feast Day 29th October

Colman hailed from Kilmacduagh, County Clare in the seventh Century. After studying in Aran, where he founded two churches on Inis Mor, he returned to become a hermit near Kinvarra. Induced

later to undertake the monastic life, he made a foundation at Kilmacduagh. He is said to have been its first Abbot and Bishop and had a reputation for being a vegetarian and having a great love of birds and animals. Kilmacduagh was erected as a Diocese at the Synod of Kells in 1152. In 1751 it was united with the Diocese of Kilfenora and in 1883 both these smaller Dioceses were integrated into the united diocese of Galway, Kilmacduagh and Kilfenora. Today at Kilmacduagh there are the remains of five churches; a leaning Round Tower 112 feet high that was restored in 1880, and the remains of an Abbot's house. St Colman's Abbatial Crozier had been used through the centuries for the swearing of Oaths and it is now kept in the National

MOON PHASES OCTOBER 2024

Sunday 27th October is Hunter's Moon (Full) day. A time for hunting animals for winter provisions.

A few basics: The Moon travels at 2286 mph around the Earth. The Moon covers a distance equal to its diameter each hour. The Earth circulates around the Sun at 107000k/hr.

Earth's Axial Rotation is 1600k/hr.

The Moon is tidal, locked with the Earth which means that it spins on its axis exactly once each time it orbits our Planet. How much we are able to see changes as the Moon travels through its orbit ... see Moon Phases Nasa Science for greater detail.

Bear in mind that we only ever see one side of the Moon i.e. half. During this spooky week you can get a daily picture of the Moon, naming standout features. Download a Night Sky App for your further enjoyment of this time of year.
